ENGLISH Our main focus in English this term is to ensure that children have ample opportunities to write effectively for a range of purposes and audiences. They should now be using a range of punctuation such as semi-colons, dashes, colons and dashes. Children have to use the punctuation precisely to enhance meaning and avoid ambiguity.

We will continue our focus on reading comprehension as children in year 6 should be able to evaluate how authors use language, including figurative language and consider how this impacts on the reader. We will also encourage them to summarise main ideas and when answering questions they should be in the habit of using quotations from the text to back up their answers.

Every Tuesday we will continue with our testing of the children to allow them to practise and learn from their mistakes.

Year 6 Curriculum Newsletter

MATHS

We have worked hard to ensure that the children have strong number skills. Time has been spent on addition, subtraction and multiplication and division. We spent a great deal of time on long division and children have revision worksheets created by Miss Majcher to remind them about key ideas. All children find the relationship between fractions, decimals and percentages difficult so we will go back to do some further revision in these areas. We will start the term covering the order of operations remembered with the initials BODMAS - ask your children if they can remember what each initial stands for. We will also work on shape and areas of triangles.

Homework – is set on a Thursday each week and returned on a Monday.

Maths & *English* – a task will be set to reinforce current learning or will be an area that needs to be revised.

SATs Revision – from CGP books for English and Maths. Please go over old tests with your children too.
