The children have responded really well to this, and many have opened up about problems that they have had on social media. In particular where children are using Snapchat, TikTok or Whatsapp.

Did you know that strangers can see your child's location if they are using Snapchat and have not turned off the automatic location setting?

Did you know that children's mental health can be affected by the number of 'likes' they get in an app and comments from strangers?

We have spoken to the parents of children involved in any issues and will continue to support the children.

The information guides give information about how to turn on privacy settings, turn off location markers and how to report and block other users.

The majority of children are sensible and try to use online apps safely, however, the reason that many of these apps (or games) have age limits of 13 or 16, is due to the fact that at primary age children's brains aren't

developed fully to be able to assess risks. They can think that things are safe when they are not, and often perceive strangers as friends - always looking for the good in others.

Two facts that shocked staff during training on our inset days:

- 1) Up to 10% of people online are looking to actively cause harm, hurt or upset.
- 2) The average time from 'Hello' to the sharing of explicit content when a child ends up in private chat with a stranger who does not have good intent is 45 minutes.

IT IS REALLY IMPORTANT THAT WE SUPPORT OUR CHILDREN TO STAY SAFE BY MONITORING THEIR USE AND ENSURING THEIR PRIVACY SETTINGS ARE HIGH.

Remember private chat can happen in games as well as messaging apps.




When you're set up, you'll be able to set 'Parent/Carer' as your user type.
